

Our open, light and modern library is the focal point of the University and will be at the heart of your Birmingham Newman learning experience.





Education, Childhood and Professional Studies

Overview

The suite of degrees within the Education, Childhood, and Professional Studies department offer a range of ways to study education as an academic discipline. Our courses provide you with an understanding of education from a sociological and philosophical perspective, providing you with the skills and knowledge to continue into a range of career opportunities, including social work, working in early years and teacher training in a number of settings. Other career opportunities might include working in further education, charities, hospitals and professional services in roles such as outreach or education coordinators.

Early Childhood Studies

Early childhood, the quality of education, provision and care, and the roles and responsibilities of all those involved with young children, parents and families, all have a significant influence on children's achievement and life chances. The last decade has seen the wider development of early years provision, changes and challenges in aspects of education and care, and the recognition that early childhood and children's experiences must be supported by a highly qualified workforce.

The Bachelor's degree is registered with the DfE as having 'full and relevant status', advantageous in early years settings in counting towards the staff:child ratios.

Studies in Primary Education

This hugely popular course draws upon psychology, sociology and philosophy to take an applied approach to understanding how we

can improve the education system and make positive change in the world. You will work alongside inspiring academics and supportive students to develop your critical thinking, communication, and creativity whilst forming lifelong friendships through engagement in collaborative projects exploring how we can develop the education system to address the challenges of the 21st century.

Education and SEND

This course reflects the many changes within the education sector, including a deepening awareness of the need to better prepare practitioners to support SEND and children's mental health. You will consider the range of issues and perspectives involved when working with children and young people in education and wider settings, and particularly those with a range of diverse needs. Exploring policy, theory and practice, you will consider the challenges to inclusive approaches to education, as well as wider educational theory relating to social justice.

Postgraduate Study

Our postgraduate degrees allow you to continue your study of education. Whether you are a teacher, early years practitioner, school leader, academic, corporate client with educational outreach programmes, or from another discipline such as health and psychology, you can find the right postgraduate programme for you.

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Primary Teacher Training

Overview

Choosing to become a Primary Teacher is your first step to inspiring children in learning about their world and here at Birmingham Newman University, we would love to support you on this journey. We understand that the Primary 3-11 age range is a crucial time for children's development and learning. It is at this formative and particularly receptive stage of development that attitudes towards learning are formed, attitudes that will impact future life course development.

During your primary teacher training course, you will undertake a range of modules, that will equip you to become an effective and creative teacher across the full age range in order to achieve the professional standards required for Qualified Teacher Status (QTS).

For those unable to meet the traditional Level 3 entry requirements for a three-year degree and for those looking to build their confidence

and academic skills, we also offer an innovative alternative route, the Primary Education (3-11) BA (Hons) with QTS (with Foundation Year). On successful completion of the foundation year modules, you join the first year of the 3-year degree in Primary Education (3-11) with a recommendation for QTS. We also offer the option of the Foundation Degree Top Up, a route that enables students, who are suitably qualified, to enter the final year of the Primary Education BA (Hons) degree. The PGCE route school based or taught - is ideal for those who have already hold a Bachelor's degree and would like to become a primary teacher.

For those wishing to work within Catholic schools, or who wish to develop their understanding of Religious education, there is also the opportunity to undertake the Catholic Certificate in Religious Studies (CCRS).

Secondary Teacher Training

Overview

If you feel passionate about becoming a secondary teacher, this course will equip you with the skills to teach pupils across the 11-16 age range. The course is designed to provoke thought, challenge assumptions and help develop you as a reflective practitioner, so you can enter the teaching profession with clear educational priorities and the skills with which to achieve them.

Through the undergraduate route, you could become a secondary school teacher within three years, while the postgraduate option is for those who already hold a degree in a relevant subject and wish to teach.

During the course, you will develop your knowledge and learn the art of teaching. You will study a range of subject specific and pedagogical modules that build on your current knowledge as you learn the practical, professional, and academic skills to become an inspirational teacher. You will understand fundamental areas of your chosen subject as well as effective ways to teach the subject within a classroom environment.

You will be taught by experienced education specialists and our dedication to small teaching groups allows you develop strong professional relationships with the University teaching team. You will also be supported by our strong relationships with our local partner schools.

The combination of seminar discussions, active workshops, online activities and one-to-one support will enable you to develop the skills you'll need to succeed in the rest of your degree.



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Postgraduate Research Degrees

Postgraduate Research Areas

A Postgraduate Research degree is a research project that makes an original contribution to knowledge in a particular area of study. At Birmingham Newman you will be guided and supported by an academic expert.

PhD (Doctor of Philosophy)

A PhD is the traditional doctoral research degree. This is awarded to students that have demonstrated the ability to design and implement a large research project that results in greater knowledge and understanding in their field of study.

M Phil (Master of Philosophy)

This can be described as a shorter version of a PhD. The qualification requires the same research, training, and planning.

At Birmingham Newman, research is regarded as an integral part of our scholarly activities. Cutting-edge work is being undertaken across a wide range of academic and professional disciplines and is attracting national and international research funding. Research projects and collaborations with leading universities, at home and abroad, have been established in several areas.

Education, Multi Professional Practice and Early Childhood

Staff are active in several areas of research and in scholarship. Research interests include educational policy; learning theory; curriculum; safeguarding; creativity and imagination in education; and early childhood education and care.

English

English at Birmingham Newman is a thriving research area with expertise in colonial and postcolonial literature, twentieth-century and contemporary writing, language, drama and print culture. As well as giving papers at national and international conferences, the team host a

research seminar series and regularly organise conferences. In addition to publishing articles, editing essay collections and literary texts, members of the team are also contracted for monographs with Cambridge University Press, Taylor and Francis, and Palgrave-Macmillan. English staff at Birmingham Newman work with published writers and dramatists to enhance regional and national literary and performance culture.

History

History at Birmingham Newman is a very successful area in terms of academic research. There is a strong research ethic within the team, who consistently produce internationallyrecognised publications. Expertise within the subject team covers a number of diverse areas: the ancient Roman world, the medieval world, early modern Britain, and modern America. All academic staff are active in their fields, attending national and international conferences, hosting conferences at Birmingham Newman and publishing widely. The History team has a proven track record in supporting postgraduate students with successful MPhils and PhDs. The supervision teams are interdisciplinary and work closely with colleagues across the Humanities.

Initial Teacher Education

Staff in the ITE department are engaged in a range of research and scholarly activities focussed on issues in education and the teaching and the development of teacher knowledge and professional learning. Research is being disseminated locally, nationally and internationally through conferences, national projects and local partnerships.

Psychology and Counselling

The Psychology and Counselling area at Birmingham Newman has a focus on issues around health, well-being, clinical and applied psychology, counselling and psychotherapy for example, students' health risk perception, health knowledge and health behaviour, narratives of untreated heavy drinking, the role of cognition in psychological disorders, and the views and experiences of same-sex couples in counselling. The subject area has major strengths in the teaching of professional courses in counselling, psychotherapy and applied aspects of psychology, and this drives the research agenda.

Sport and Health

The Sport and Health subject area is an active and successful research group at Birmingham Newman. There is a strong research ethos, with a highly committed team of early career and experienced researchers. The scholarly work of this enthusiastic team involves: physical activity and health-related behaviours of young people and adults; socio-cultural experiences within sport; physiological and psychological aspects of sports performance, as well as influences on sports officials, the biomechanical perspective on performance improvement and reduction of injury and creativity within teaching styles.

Social Work and Social Policy

The Social Work and Social Policy Group are an inter-disciplinary team with a strong research profile in several academic and professional areas. Current staff interests cover a diverse range of research topics including: social justice and social policy, all aspects of working with

children, young people and communities, queer and critical pedagogy, critical criminology, safeguarding, fostering and social care, social geography, children's rights and advocacy, violence and harm and conceptions of vulnerability. Postgraduate students are fully supported to be centrally included in all the research activities of the team, including postgraduate training, seminar presentations and in preparation for their future careers.

Theology

Research supervision for PhD/MPhil awards (both full and part-time) is offered in a number of areas of theology, particularly Christian theology. Current staff research interests include biblical studies, early post-biblical Judaism, patristics, contemporary philosophical theology, the history of philosophy and ethics. The team are also able to work with those wishing to apply theological reflection to their ministry or professional practice. Creating strong support networks for students and building good relationships between staff and students is at the heart of the approach to study. Members of the Theology team regularly present papers at international conferences and publish books and articles in their areas of particular expertise – further details can be found on the staff profiles section of the Birmingham Newman University website.



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Research Centres

The Research Centres form part of the structure of the Graduate School with several key aims: supporting staff participating in research and scholarly activities through the development of an inclusive culture and progressive environment; supporting the achievement of research excellence through focused growth, collaboration and development of applied research across the university and, where appropriate, with external partners; and developing opportunities to secure external sources of research funding that will expand the range of current research activities. The Research Centres contribute to ensuring students are taught by excellent researchers and course content remains at the forefront of developments in the subject area.

The Centre for Community and Social Justice

At the heart of Birmingham Newman University's values and ethos lies a commitment to the principles of social justice, and the common good. The core purpose of this interdisciplinary Centre for Community and Social Justice, therefore, is to bring together diverse communities to think critically about relations of power, social inequities and injustices in order to create a more inclusive, equal and democratic society. The Centre encourages external communities and organisations to join academic staff and students to research collaboratively and to disseminate knowledge in order to combat social injustices for the wider social good.

Humanities Research Centre

The Centre aims to promote research excellence and foster relationships between scholars in all of the University's departments across the Humanities. Each year, the Centre has a number of key focal points for research while facilitating other internal and external collaborations. The Humanities Research Centre is a vibrant community made up of staff and postgraduate students from Drama, English, History and Theology; it also includes colleagues from other disciplines who work in Humanities related areas.

Newman Institute for Leadership in Education (NILE)

NILE is a hub for a growing network of services offered by the Faculty of Education at Birmingham Newman University. It will be of interest to those involved in leadership in early years settings, schools, colleges and universities. In particular those involved in pastoral care leadership, pedagogic leadership and faith-based leadership will find this research centre valuable. NILE activities include research-based seminars and workshops.

NILE is also well-positioned and able to offer expertise in research and consultancy.

Key thematic foci underpinning the research agenda in NILE are:

- pedagogic leadership
- leading and managing faith-based education
- multi-professional educational management and leadership
- · inclusive leadership models
- leadership and management in all phases of education (early years, school, college, university)
- pastoral care leadership

The Bible and its Reception Research Centre

Birmingham Newman's Research Centre for the Bible and its Reception engages with the academic study of the Jewish and Christian Bible, its later reception (in art, music, literature and culture) and its relevance to contemporary society. The primary research interests of the Centre's staff include literary readings of the Bible, the Bible in art and visual culture, and early Jewish and early Christian biblical interpretation and study of its early textual forms.


The multicultural region of the West Midlands, in which Birmingham Newman is situated, is an ideal location for the exploration of the sacred texts of three of the world's major religions (Judaism, Christianity and Islam) which interconnect in so many ways. The research centre is located within the Theology subject area, providing opportunities for research students to network with scholars of international standing and to benefit from engagement with an active research culture.

Sport, Exercise and Health Research Centre

The work of this Centre contributes towards the generation of high quality applied research of regional, national and international significance that facilitates the work of practitioners involved in sport, exercise and health. The Centre's staff engage in developing collaborative research in partnership with the local community, schools and third sector organisations. The Research Centre places particular emphasis on multi-disciplinary applied research topics - for example, physical activity and health related behaviours of young people and adults; socio-cultural experiences within sport; psychological and physiological aspects of sports performance: including the training and conditioning of athletes; and the evaluation of projects in the areas of sport, exercise and

The Romero Freire Institute

The Institute seeks to build capacity for the scholarship of learning and teaching practices in Higher Education, focusing largely on critical pedagogy. It is uniquely made up of representatives from academics, professional and support staff, students, alumni, and members of the local community. It has a broad reach and acts as a bridge and mediator between student and community research, consultancy and evaluation, the scholarship of teaching and learning and academic research in Higher Education. The aims of the institute are to generate a creative space where all staff, students and the community can come together in common cause, develop research agendas, co-create knowledge, and undertake actions that advance the common good.

Key points to remember

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Entry Requirements



Birmingham Newman University welcomes students with a wide range of qualifications. This ensures that those who have studied different qualifications are treated equally in the admissions process. The entry requirements for Birmingham Newman University undergraduate courses are based on the UCAS tariff points allocated to qualifications and grades.

Additional academic entry requirements

The following 3-year degrees have additional requirements:

A Level (or equivalent) in a Humanities/Social Sciences related subject.

Initial Teacher Education:

Primary – GCSE English Language, Mathematics and Science at grade 4 (or C) or above. Secondary – GCSE English Language and Mathematics at grade 4 (or C) or above.

Mathematics:

A Level Grade C or above in Mathematics is required.

Sport and Exercise Science: Sport Coaching:

A level 3 qualification (e.g. A Level or BTEC level 3) in a sport, PE or science related subject.

Youth and Community Work:

All applicants are required to be interviewed as part of the professional body requirements.

Nursing Adult/Mental Health:

GCSE/IGCSE English language and maths grades 9-4/A*-C or equivalent. Enhanced Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS) check.

Occupational Therapy:

GCSE/IGCSE English language and maths grades 9-4/A*-C or equivalent.

Applicants will also be required to be successful at a values-based in person interview. Enhanced Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS) check.

Paramedic Science:

GCSE/IGCSE English Language and Maths grades 9-4/A*-C or equivalent. GCSE/IGCSE Biology or Human Biology grade 9-4/A*-C or equivalent.

Applicants will also be required to be successful at a values-based in person interview. Enhanced Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS) check.

Physiotherapy:

GCSE/IGCSE biology or human biology grade 9-4/A*-C or equivalent*

*Pass in a biology-focused module, e.g. anatomy and physiology, human biology, as part of a relevant Level 3 qualification is regarded as an equivalent for entrance.

Enhanced Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS) check.

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Health check requirements:

As part of the Health Clearance Checks, you are required to provide information about your immunity and vaccination status for the following courses:

Mental Health nursing Nursing Adult Occupational Therapy Paramedic Science Physiotherapy

Candidates must prove they have been immunised against Rubella, Tuberculosis and Hepatitis B. We strongly recommend that all successful applicants (unless exempt on medical grounds) receive a full course of COVID-19 and influenza vaccinations before commencing the course.

Candidates must receive a satisfactory occupational health clearance before commencing the course.

Contextual admissions

The tradition of the University is to ensure a holistic approach when considering applications from prospective students. This is supportive of the University's commitment to widening participation and social justice. In line with this and the University's admissions policy. The decision will be informed by academic and admissions staff based on contextual information including details of additional qualifications and relevant experience.

Undergraduate Initial Teacher Education (ITE)

- A Level students: a minimum of 112 UCAS points including a minimum of CC at A Level (A-Level General Studies is not accepted)
- BTEC Extended Diploma: a minimum of 112 UCAS points (DMM) in your BTEC Extended diploma
- BTEC Diploma: a minimum of 112 UCAS points including minimum grades of D*D* in your BTEC diploma
- Access Diploma: you will need to have completed the course and achieved a minimum of 112 UCAS points.

Prior to enrolment, GCSEs (or recognised equivalent) at grade 4 (or C) or above in English Language, Mathematics, and Science are required for Primary ITE.

GCSEs (or recognised equivalent) at grade 4 (or C) or above in English Language and Mathematics are required for Secondary ITE.

Key Skills, Adult Literacy or Adult Numeracy are not accepted as GCSE equivalent for Initial Teacher Education courses. If the qualifications you are studying are not indicated above please contact Admissions on 0121 476 1181 or email admissions@newman.ac.uk for clarification. School experience is not an essential requirement. However, having experience in a school will:

- help ensure that you are making the right decision to join the programme
- give you a potential advantage when starting the course as you will be able to make links between your learning and how this relates to a school setting

If you are invited to interview, this will either be at Birmingham Newman or virtually.

You will also need to obtain Enhanced Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS) clearance and meet the requirements for Fitness to Train to Teach.

Postgraduate Initial Teacher Training - PGCE

A UK bachelors degree (or equivalent). School experience is not an essential requirement for this course, however, at interview you will have the opportunity to tell us about any school experience you have gained. You will also be required to undertake a short teaching activity.

You will need to obtain Enhanced Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS) clearance and meet the requirements for Fitness to Train and Teach. As well as these requirements, you will need the following, depending on which programme you apply for:

PGCE Primary (including School Direct)
A UK bachelors degree (or equivalent). You should also have GCSEs (or a recognised equivalent) in English Language, Mathematics and Science at grade 4 (or C) or above on enrolment.



PGCE Secondary (11–16 years) with Post-16 enhancement (including School Direct)

A UK bachelors degree (or equivalent) of which approximately 50% is related to the relevant subject – or a recognised equivalent qualification. You will also need GCSEs (or a recognised equivalent) in English Language and Mathematics at grade 4 (or C) or above on enrolment. You may also need to take a Subject Knowledge Enhancement (SKE) course if your degree does not directly link to your chosen teaching subject.

Additional information

Enhanced Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS) If your course or your placement involves working with children or adults at risk, you will need to apply, through Birmingham Newman, for an Enhanced Disclosure via the Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS). There is an initial fee of £61 for this. If you already have a valid Enhanced Disclosure and have paid the annual subscription fee of £13, you will need to show your DBS clearance and provide a link to your online DBS record. Contact Admissions on 0121 476 1181 or visit www.gov.uk/dbs for more information. Please note that Enhanced DBS clearance must be gained before enrolment for teacher training courses.

Fitness to Train to Teach

All universities have to ensure that entrants on Initial Teacher Education courses have met the Secretary of State's requirements for physical and mental capacity to teach. We take great care to make sure that while all candidates meet these requirements, we do not discriminate against people with disabilities in our selection procedures, requirements for progression, completion of training or provision of services.

Master's degrees

You will normally be expected to have an honours degree. Of course, you must be able to demonstrate commitment to pursuing your studies at a higher level. Additional entry requirements may vary for each course, and can be found on the relevant course pages.

Research degrees

Students studying for a research degree at master's level will normally have a first class or 2:1 honours degree in a subject relevant to the research proposal.

What you need to know when applying to a teacher training course

Teacher Training courses require you to attend an interview. It will help your application if you have an up-to-date knowledge of the education sector, evidence of any experience working with children. You should be prepared for a one-toone and peer group interview.

If you are offered a place this will be conditional on gaining a DBS clearance and meeting requirements for fitness to train to teach before you start your programme.

PGCEs:

Apply via DfE from mid-October 2024 for 2025 entry. It's important to apply early as on some courses can close when allocation is filled.

What happens when I apply?

Once you have submitted your application to UCAS, it will be forwarded to Birmingham Newman University for consideration.
